Music Notes from Mr. Loughrin

How many instruments of the orchestra can you name? (answer key below)

Lakewood 1st graders and 3rd graders are doing an intensive study of instrument families and the instruments of the orchestra. We generally divide musical instruments into four instrument families: Strings, Woodwinds, Brass and Percussion. Instruments are classified by how they generate sound (or make music). Lakewood 1st graders are learning the families and classifying instruments into their respective families as well as learning about the sounds they make. Lakewood 3rd graders are not only classifying instruments into families, but also studying the science and mechanics of different instruments, thereby making them experts on exactly how each instrument works.
