Greetings Lakewood Families,

Science Night is back! Join us at school on Thursday, January 19, 2023, from 6:00-7:30 p.m. The Outdoor Discovery Center will host an "Up Close and Wild!" booth, and the West Ottawa High School Robotics team will offer cool hands-on learning opportunities for our students. In addition, fun chemistry demos, Ozobots, and a station with 3-D printing, robotic arm control and an AI voice app will all be available to check out!

Students will have the opportunity to put their own scientific curiosity on display in the form of student projects (Grades K-2: 6:00 - 6:45, Grade 3 -5: 6:45 - 7:30 pm). Students in grades K - 2 are encouraged to create a project or demonstration. Students in grades 3 - 5 can attempt to work through the scientific process with their investigation, which means they should do some sort of an experiment rather than simply a demonstration. Teachers will send home forms to support this.

We are looking for a few volunteers to assist at stations and with student projects. Check for an email from the Lakewood PTO with how you can help! Thanks in advance for your help and participation!

In addition, we are pleased once again to host our **Kindergarten Show-case** for incoming Kindergarten students and their families on **Thurs-day**, **January 26 from 6:00 - 7:00 pm**. WHAT CAN PARENTS DO?

Every winter, bad weather — snow, slush, freezing temperatures or even heavy rains — can present challenges to getting children to school. So do the illnesses such as colds, flu, fevers and earaches that often come with the winter months. Students might also have to stay home due to Covid-19.

Develop back up plans for getting your children to school in bad weather.

- a. Check to see who can give your children a ride to school if you aren't able to take them or the bus doesn't arrive.
- Talk with your school about forming a "walking school bus" with other families to get students to school safely.
- Contact your local government if roads to school are not regularly plowed.
- d. Join other families to clear snow from the sidewalks closest to the school.
- Tell school administrators about transportation challenges, including safety,
 and ask if they have plans for transporting students.

2. Keep your children healthy.

- Maintain a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- Ensure students eat a good breakfast every morning or check to see if your school serves breakfast.
- Ensure your children visit their medical provider and have received their vaccines, including flu and Covid.
- Stress hand washing, particularly before and after eating, and after using the restroom.
- Reinforce the importance of avoiding close contact with individuals who are sick, and not sharing cups and/or utensils with others.
- f. If your children seem anxious about going to school, ask teachers, school counselors, your medical provider and parents for advice on how to make your children feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- g. If you are concerned your children may have Covid, call your medical provider or school nurse for advice.

Keep your children engaged in learning if they cannot attend school in person.


- Ask your teacher or school for resources that you can use at home to keep your children learning, including computer tablets, internet access and online learning platforms.
- Identify who can support your children's learning at home, especially if you must go to work.
- Encourage your children to call classmates and stay connected to the teacher to find out about what they missed.

The Recorder...then and now!

4th and 5th recorder unit!!!

Lakewood 4th and 5th graders have embarked on a recorder unit that we will visit throughout the remainder of the year. The recorder is a terrific "first instrument". Starting in 4th grade, West Ottawa students are given the opportunity apply all they have learned about music and put it together and learn to play a woodwind instrument. The recorder is a very old instrument, dating back over 600 years and is the great grandparent of the modern-day flute. It's design dates back to the time of Henry VIII of England in the 14th Century. The basic design of the recorder has not changed much since then. Recorders were first made of wood (and many still are), however now you can find recorders made of plastic that are more durable, very affordable, and fairly easy to play, which makes the recorder the perfect "first instrument" to learn in an elementary school music program.

Morning Drop Off

Student Pick Up

If you need to pick up a student before normal dismissal time, please give the front office a call and email your student's teacher.

After 9:00 AM, you can park in the driveway directly in front of the office.

Please remember to sign out your student.



Please **do not** park in the circle drive by the front office between 8-9am and 3-4pm.

You may park in the large parking lot on the southside of the building.

Our special needs buses use the circle drive during those times and need full access to the drive to safely pick up and drop off our special needs students. Thank you for understanding!

SICK STUDENTS

Illness happens—we understand! If your student must stay home due to illness, please call the front office. Tell us your student's name, teacher, and symptoms.

Call 616-786-1300 and press "1" for the attendance line.

If a student becomes ill while at school, we may send the student home for monitoring with a parent or guardian. Ensure your contact information and preferred emergency contacts are up to date in your student's file!



NORMAL ILLNESS PROCEDURE

To reduce the spread of any illness within the school, we ask that you keep your child home if they are sick.

Please also keep your child home until they are 24-hours free of vomiting, diarrhea, and fever (without the use of fever-reducing medication).

And, of course, keep your child's teacher and the front office posted.
